When His Grace, Bishop Benedict spoke to the Annual Diocesan Assembly in October, 2024, he first reminded those gathered, "I addressed you last year, hoping you would not elect me! But I still love you."

That love was reflected in Bishop Benedict's active leadership in his first year since his nomination on Oct. 28, 2023, and his consecration on Dec. 2. He has visited most of our parishes, he had, in his own words, "an amazing experience" at Youth Rally, and has been diligently learning the perspectives and contours of this diocese.

Diocesan Assembly in Rhode Island

Delegates from across New England gathered for the Annual Diocesan Assembly in Cumberland, RI, Oct. 26–27, 2024, with renewed energy under the leadership of His Grace, Bishop Benedict. In the bishop's report, he noted many signs of fresh growth. Land in Vermont has been donated for the eventual foundation of a monastery in New England, a hope of many successive bishops. He has convened a new Diocesan Choir with singers from across New England [which sang for the first time at a Hierarchical Divine Liturgy on Jan. 1, 2025, at Holy Transfiguration Church]. He gave thanks to God that 155 were led into the Church through Baptism or Chrismation, compared with just 52 funerals in the diocese.

Chancellor Fr. John Kreta celebrated that diocesan membership reversed a years-long decline and now exceeds 2019 levels. The search continues for a permanent bishop's residence, and the budget has been thoroughly adjusted to meet the new responsibility of a resident bishop of our own. He welcomed Barry Migyanko, formerly of the OCA Chancery, who serves as a part-time assistant to the bishop and is skillfully improving the standard of diocesan administration.

Both bishop and chancellor emphasized the importance of clergy health and well-being. Fr. Kreta highlighted the new Financial Health Initiative of the OCA Office of Pastoral Life. He noted research that high percentages of clergy families have significant financial stresses.

At your enthronement, I recalled the love in the diocese for previous bishops. You have already manifested that great love for all of your diocese. We ask the good Lord to grant you many years."



Bishop Benedict responded, "Don't stop praying. I need it. Through those prayers, I am granted ability to serve this diocese."

The joy was palpable

"For thou shalt make him most blessed forever, filling him with the joy of thy countenance" (Ps. 20:6 LXX, D. Sheehan's translation in *The Psalms of David*).

Over the thirty-five years that I've been a member of the Orthodox Church, I've attended a number of parish churches and been blessed to live in and around several monastic communities. So I'm no stranger to hierarchical liturgies. Bishop Job was probably my first. My earliest memory of him is his outlasting my son Rowan Benedict at Youth Rally in consecutive roller coaster rides. Bishop Job was such a dear friend, mentor, and model to that generation of kids, and a truly humble and fun-loving man.

Later, I'd watch him enter a church and stand patiently in the center to suffer the long, meticulous process of vesting at the hands of nervous and inexperienced subdeacons (my husband Don among them), piece by piece receiving from his people the accoutrements of a hierarch that would reveal him—slowly, naturally, and profoundly—as the living presence of Christ in our midst.

Over the years, I seem to have slipped into taking this transformation for granted and becoming less aware of the miracle that was taking place in this moment, perhaps not even thinking about it. But last Sunday, as Bishop Benedict served his



first hierarchical liturgy at Holy Resurrection in Claremont, NH, there it was again—Joy Himself—real, palpable, and everywhere present.

I don't have the words to properly convey my experience of this. To the extent it was a feeling, I felt it in my heart as a solid fullness.

Remembering it, I can almost feel it still, and I am reminded of a time very early in my Orthodox life when, angry with my mother for her scornful atheism, I excused myself, left the room to go stand before my icons in prayer, and Christ, as an icon floating in the air, told me that I must stop clawing at her for a love she couldn't give. Rather, I must receive His love and give it to her. Then He filled my heart with His love, and I found I was able to do that!

A decade later, during my mother's last illness, we were listening

together to Brahms's Requiem when suddenly she sat straight up in her bed, fixed her astonished gaze toward an upper corner of the room, raised her arms, and passed on.

Dr. Mary Ford writes in her forthcoming book, *The Gate of Heaven: Theosis and Temple in the Gospel According to St. John*, that "Jesus is Himself the 'place of God's presence,' where His glory will be revealed. He is Himself the new house of God/gate of heaven, the Logos tabernacling among us (as in John 1:14)."

This tabernacling of the Logos in Christ, and through Him in each of us, is imaged and actualized liturgically in the vesting of the Bishop after he has entered into the church. Or so I understood it last week, recognizing it by the Joy that filled our temple as this humble man was raised up by us to be Christ's presence among us.

We are blessed indeed in our new bishop, Benedict, who seems to have the humility to know and thereby teach us, his flock, that, in all our inadequacy, we, too, can be clothed in God's glory as we learn to forego the temptations to pride. And it comes to us then as surprising and palpable joy (a phrasing for which I owe thanks to our Deacon Greg Uhrin).







Steven Hosking delivered an inspiring presentation on the life and context of Saint Olga of Alaska, whose glorification was announced after the Assembly. As an adult, the saint lived as a mother,

midwife, healer, matushka, storyteller, craft maker and teacher. She learned English herself and taught teachers' aides English as well. She knew and sang the entirety of many services, including Holy Week, by heart. Fr. Steven shared a new icon of St. Olga, with the words, "God can create beauty from complete desolation." Slides of the presentation will be published at the diocesan website, <u>dneoca.org</u>.

His Grace asked the diocese to recognize the tremendous efforts of Bob Popadick, who put in innumerable hours to analyze, report, plan and explain the finances of diocese. He gave Bob a copy of the diocesan icon, asking that he remember the diocese in his daily prayers.

The Diocesan Assembly was led through that complex financial analysis, to understand the current state of the diocesan budget and the implications of different plans for funding and purchasing a residence for Bishop Benedict.

For several years, the Fair Share mandates for each parish have not been adjusted for inflation, and now on top



of this we have sole responsibility for the support of our own bishop. The Assembly agreed to authorize raising the cap on withdrawals from investment accounts from 5% to 10% recognizing this higher level is not sustainable and not intended for more than five years. It also committed to planned increases to Fair Share, starting in 2025.

The proposed deficit budget for 2025 provoked searching discussion of the state of stewardship in the diocese. There was widespread recognition that we need to challenge our parishes and members to be better stewards of what they have. We should be freely giving so that we don't have to draw extra funding from the diocesan endowment.

Fr. Mark Roosien shared an inspiring account of how his predecessor, Fr. Steven Belonick, introduced a plan at Holy Ghost Church, Bridgeport, to dedicate 10% to charity and outreach. It took ten years, but they now have the full 10% allocated. Fr. Mark said the challenge changed the whole attitude from thinking of contributing to the church as a burden to minimize to a gift, an act of joyful thanksgiving. Many in the discussion expressed the hope that our diocese would embrace this kind of vision for giving.

The budget passed, but the Acting Treasurer, Deacon Jordan Vargas, was asked to include with the annual notice of each parish's Fair Share an invitation to voluntarily contribute a modest free-will offering to close the deficit.

The Assembly was surrounded by prayer and worship, as always, but now with His Grace presiding. The heart of the Assembly each year is the Hierarchical Divine Liturgy, at which Bishop Benedict led the clergy and faithful from across New England in joining the work of the Assembly to that of the Church throughout all ages, as well as the everlasting offering of praise before the throne of God.

As the Assembly concluded, the charge from the report of Chancellor Fr. Kreta remained worthy to recall: "I look forward with great joy and anticipation to see all that God will guide us to in the coming months and years, as we continue



the work given all of us for the building up of the life of the Diocese of New England.... Let us always remember, 'Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord and not for men, knowing that from the Lord, you will receive the inheritance as your reward. You are serving the Lord Christ''' (Col 3:23–24).


VISION – MISSION – VALUES


